

THE PRESIDENT'S

A STRATEGIC VISION FOR A STRATEGIC TIME

The are living in historic days. God has privileged us to welcome the new millennium by celebrating a century of service. One hundred years ago our founders greeted the dawn of the 20th Century with optimism and faith. Their confidence that well-trained Christian workers could impact the world, reform a nation, and raise up a holy people was not misplaced. Since those early days, God's Bible School and College has produced servants of the Lord who have traveled to every corner of the earth, evangelizing, educating, and building up the church in every way. Her presses have published holiness books that have covered the globe and influenced generations of Christians. Her passion for outreach has mothered ministries of every description. Through the influence of GBS, its students, and its spin-off ministries, an innumerable host of souls have entered the kingdom of God.

I praise God for such a wonderful heritage! Institutionally, however, we cannot simply live in the glory of our yesteryears. The great exploits of GBS's first century are now a part of history. The strong and fearless leaders of the past now rest in their graves, awaiting resurrection and reward. It is up to us, the living, to serve our day and advance God's cause. Just as the glory and splendor of the autumn leaves must give way to the new buds of spring, so we must move ahead with new triumphs of our own. Such a task requires careful planning and clear vision. A vital part of my responsibility as President is to provide that vision.

Vision is crucial to any organization. Without vision an institution will stumble along, wasting precious moments and limited resources. At best, it will accept the status quo; and at worst, it will stagnate and die. Vision is more than gazing into the future and uttering high-sounding dreams. Frankly, the future is only one aspect of vision. A true vision must include a look in three directions: The past (where we have been), the present (where we are now), and the future (where do we want to go?). Out of this tri-directional look, a strategic vision can be formulated that will perpetuate a movement well into the future.

Over the past two years, the Board of Trustees, Administration, faculty, and staff have been involved in developing a strategic plan to guide GBS into the future. We began that process by looking into our past and asking the question, "What are the core values that have anchored this institution for a century?" These values are, and must ever be, the driving focus of what we are and what we desire to be for the glory of God. Committing to these values as the core of what and who we are will help propel our school forward through change, and yet help us remain faithful to our heritage. (p23)



Tot even the Irish cop whirling his nightstick in front of O'Digory's Saloon nor the spotted Dalmatian chasing the horse-drawn fire engine was more familiar to 19th-century city dwellers than the lamplighter. Appearing each day at twi-

light, he would trudge slowly down the cobblestones, stopping at each cast-iron lantern post. There he would place his ladder against the crosspiece, climb up to the polished globe, open a valve, and then ignite the gas; and soon rows of mellow, dancing flames would defy the encroaching night.

"Please, sir, what are you doing? once asked a little lad, spellbound by the magic which the lamplighter was working just outside his SLUMS BELOW.

door. As the old man picked up his ladder, he smiled and said, "Son, I'm punching holes in the darkness!"

Where outside the Bible is there a better description of God's call than this? For we who follow Jesus are to spend our lives, as did He, giving "light to those who sit in darkness and the shadow of death." That light is the gospel, centered in His death and resurrec-

tion; and that darkness is Satan's realm, where evil legions mock Our Lord and rage against His church. He who is the brightness of His Father's glory is also the "light of the world" who has led us from the darkness to Himself. In the final triumph He will

turn all shadows into sunshine; but until then, we are His lamplighters, sent out everywhere, punching holes in the darkness.

For 100 years God's Bible School has been doing exactly this. Our centenary has reminded us that Knapp's little band of stouthearts raised their gleaming "city on a hill" to illuminate the darkened slums below them, as well as the darkened regions around them. In the decades since, their resolve has unfolded into a dauntless venture in Christian

lamplighting which has extended throughout the world. Granted, there have been missteps and mishaps along the way; but even so, the darkness would be far darker, except for the light which has flashed from the Mount of Blessings.

This is cause for joyous and magnificent celebration. From everywhere, GBS's sons and daughters have come home to honor sacred names and gallant deeds, to hear the song of Hope Cottage girls echoing from the chapel walls, and to repeat the heroics of those splendid lads who helped OMS evangelize Japan. ecently some members of the administrative team took a look at the school's mission statement. You will not believe how we agonized over the wording! Phrase by phrase. Word by word. It finally came down to one word. Things fell into place when we changed a preposition—a "by" to a "thus." Now everybody was happy, and peace reigned again on campus.

Although I am being a little facetious, make no mistake about this—we are serious about our mission! In a time when schools seem to be market-driven, we want our mission to be the force that guides and drives our institutional behavior. While we want to be aware of, and responsive to, changes in our environment, we intend on staying true to our core values and our mission.

Core values are the organization's essential and enduring tenets—a small set of timeless guiding principles that require no external justification, for they have intrinsic value and importance to those inside the organization. We have identified the following as our core values: passion for God; the authority of Scripture; educational excellence; character formation; evangelism, missions

and social concern. In staying true to these values, we will achieve our mission.

While we want to preserve the core, we also want to stimulate progress. In their classic book, *Built to Last*, Collins and Porras argue that rather than giving in to the "tyranny of the OR" we should strive to find the "genius of the AND." We do not have to choose either to preserve the core or to stimulate progress. We need to find ways to do both.

Contrary to popular wisdom, the proper first response to a changing world is not to ask, "What should we change?" but rather, "What do we stand for and why do we exist?" for it is our

task to manage both continuity and change. In so doing, God's Bible School and College will continue being a spiritually vibrant institution that is academically excellent, growth-oriented, student-centered, and financially sound.

The gyroscope is a mechanism that has successfully guided ships, airplanes and satellites for over a century. It combines the stability of the inner wheel with the free movement of the pivoting frame. Institutionally, preserving the core values of the school gives us inner stability. As long as we maintain this stability, we can take appropriate actions to



take advantage of current opportunities, thus stimulating progress. Let me identify a few areas in which we intend to make significant progress:

Encouraging excellence. We are serious about the quality of education that we offer our students. We will focus mainly on beating GBS—not the competition—striving for continuous improvement of our faculty credentials, curriculum, and classroom instruction.

Planning programs. We are always evaluating our courses and tweaking them in order to have the best programs possible. Additionally, we are not opposed to adding new programs or creating new vehicles for delivering existing programs to new target groups.

Under this current catalog, we have added programs like the BA in Church and Family Ministries, AA in General Business, and AA in Office Administration. We are working on new delivery systems for people who cannot come to campus on a full-time basis.

Scheduling succession. We are intent on building a team committed to our core values that will help us to fulfill our mission for years to come. Shortly after assuming my position at GBS, I discussed with the administration the fact I was going to be looking for a person to replace me. I also charged the college divisional chairs with the same task. Since it is important to have strong leadership at the divisional level, we

must be nurturing those who will assume these positions in the future.

God's Bible School and College has already entered its second century, and we must remember the lesson of the gyroscope. By preserving essential core values while simultaneously stimulating necessary progress, we will ensure that opportunities for service will continue to expand! We ask your prayers that God will be our source of strength in the exciting challenge which confronts us. 






GBS TO LAUNCH ALDERSGATE STUDY PROGRAM

"It really comes across as a plea for help, often from a young pastor who has a growing awareness that he needs more training. However, he has a family and a second job. Thus Dr. Kenneth Farmer, Vice-President for Academic Affairs, explains the purpose of GBS's Aldersgate Program, which will be launched this fall "for those who cannot attend Bible college on a full-time basis." Initiated by President Avery, the program is being developed with missionary educators Charles and Lottie Tryon, who have been involved in curriculum development and delivery for many years. It will offer periodic blocks of classes for those wishing to complete an AA in Bible and Theology or a BA in Ministerial Education. Further information will appear in the *Revivalist* at a later date.

GBS STUDENTS SPONSOR INNER-CITY OUTREACH PICNIC





MELVIN SCHAPER RECEIVES HIGH HONORS IN GRENADA by Larry D. Smith

elvin L. Schaper, GBS alumnus, former faculty member, and member of the Board of Trustees, was honored February 7 in Grenada for his services to that nation. Under the auspices of the Bible Holiness Church (formerly the Fire Baptized Holiness Church), Schaper, along with his wife Joy, founded St. John's Christian Secondary School. Speeches at Independence Day celebration were delivered by the Prime Minister, Dr.

Keith C. Mitchell, and the Governor General, Sir Daniel Williams. Williams also presented Mr. Schaper with an award citation.

"My grandparents took their seven children, ages 2–15 years of age, from Independence, Kansas, to Grenada in 1964," explains Sharlyn Splean of Hobe Sound, Florida. "They had been given permission to start a school in a vacated cocoa drying warehouse. They arrived in November and worked steadily to

have the drying house turned into classrooms in time for school to start in January. This was the beginning of St. John's Christian Secondary School, which was the first secondary school in this area.

"Grandpa would see prospective students of all ages loitering in the streets or sitting on a bridge and invite them to 'just observe a few classes.' His desire was to whet their appetite for higher education. He was usually successful. If lack of money were the reason they didn't come to school, Grandpa would find some odd job to allow them to pay the small fee, or he would privately pay it himself. Today, students of St. John's Christian Secondary School are in positions of influence in several countries. Many continued their education and now lead professional careers as teachers, ministers, doctors, lawyers, bankers, politicians, law enforcement officers, nurses, and research scientists. A great number of upstanding citizens would proudly tell you that they are alumni of SJCSS or "Schaper School."

Melvin Schaper was a student at GBS from 1941-1943 and honors the memory of such outstanding teachers as Dr. Roberts, Dr. Holland, Miss Peabody, Mr. Cowdrey, and Professor Menard. He furthered his preparation for ministry by completing the following degree programs: BA, Greenville College, 1945; BD (now MDiv), Asbury Theological Seminary, 1947; Princeton Theological Seminary, ThM, 1948, and MS Ed, Kansas State University at Pittsburg, Kansas, 1962.

By the time he had finished his work at Princeton, he remembers. "I was so eager to get a wedding arranged and in the plans that I stopped a couple of days at Troy Camp and then went to California, and Joy finished her AB degree at UCLA in August, 1948, and our wedding was in November." He and his wife, the former Carol Joy Firkins, were to become the parents of seven children, all of whom were present at the awards presentation in Grenada. They also have 23 grandchildren and eight greatgrandchildren.

Brother and Sister Schaper's life together has included many years of educational, supervisory, and pastoral ministry. From 1986–1991 they were at GBS, where he taught Bible and theology in the college and she taught English and earth science in the high school. Since 1998 he has served as a member of the Board of Trustees. Currently they reside in

Ochelata, Oklahoma. GBS, the Alumni Association, and all the "Revivalist Family" congratulate Melvin and Joy Schaper for their life of Christian service!


→ (p7) direction to others to live as models of separation from the world and in Christian simplicity.

as I begin this article, I have been on the job officially for less than thirty days. It seems like I have been swimming in numbers as I have worked through stacks of financial records, familiarizing myself as to where we have come from and where we are today, all with the purpose of formulating a plan as to where we are heading.

The one thing I am keenly aware of is that God has been faithful to God's Bible School in providing its needs. Year after year, He has performed miracle upon miracle in generating our needed finances through the obedient stewardship of you, our faithful donors. As we look to the future, we realize our continued dependence upon Him for our needs and our dependence upon you for continued support as He directs you in your giving.

In the few short days I have been here, I have developed two important financial tools that will aid us in managing the financial resources provided to GBS and help us be good financial stewards. These tools will also aid us in attaining the goals we have established for the next five year. These goals are as follows:

• Provide the absolute necessities to accomplish our mission and fund the "Five Year Strategic Plan" outlined and approved by the Board of Trustees. Our basic task in a nutshell is to establish and maintain a Bible College which exists to prepare men and women for Christian life and service; to establish and maintain a high school which exists to provide secondary education with a Christian emphasis; to establish and maintain an academy which exists to

provide elementary education with a Christian emphasis; and to publish a religious periodical called *God's Revivalist and Bible Advocate*.

- Eliminate all debt within three to five years.
- Within five years, provide for a cash flow equal to approximately ninety days of operating needs.
- Continue to upgrade educational facilities and resources, including staff/faculty housing.
- Upgrade staff/faculty compensation packages.

As you can see, the goals we have established are aggressive; but we feel they are God-directed goals which He will help us to attain.

Two tools which we have developed for financial management are as follows:

- (1) We have redesigned our monthly financial statements. These will track where we are on a monthly basis as compared both to where we were the previous year and to where we projected we would be through carefully prepared budgets.
- (2) We have put in place a budgeting process, along with budgeting worksheets, that will enable us to put togeth-

er meaningful budget projections that cover a five year period. Budgets will be prepared on an annual basis and will be used to measure our actual performance in order to evaluate our progress towards reaching our goals.

As we move into the future, we believe that the use of these tools will help us to be better managers of God's provisions and also of your contributions. We appreciate your prayers and faithful support to God's Bible School. The GBS staff and faculty team pledge that with God's help we will be good stewards of the finances God provides and always be worthy of your support.

There are breathtaking developments in world missions today, and our department will be dedicated to staying on the cutting edge.



od is blessing the Division of Ministerial Education at God's Bible School and College. Five years ago we had 26 ministerial students. In contrast, we concluded this year with 52 ministerial students, plus 16 Bible/theology students (AA degree).

Because we are committed to producing students who can preach, we now require our ministerial majors to take one preaching class per semester in a spiraling sequence of eight semesters of homiletics. When churches contact us, we want to be able to send them young people who know how to prepare Biblical messages and communicate effectively. We want to raise up a new generation of preachers who diligently consider the contextual meaning of Scripture and are able to apply the truth to our contemporary situation.

Our purpose is to ground our holiness teaching to contextual exegesis, and the result is gratifying. Our students are telling us that their former confusion about holiness in general, and entire sanctification in particular, is disappearing. Many now testify to a clear experience of entire sanctification and rejoice over the new confidence they have in their ability to share their faith with others.

We want our students to become so thoroughly saturated with Scripture that they will begin to evaluate all of their decisions in light of relevant Scriptures. Being able to turn to the Bible and give a Scriptural basis for one's faith is extremely important. To this end we teach our students to organize their Bibles in such a way that they can find and explain to others what they believe.

For students going into full-time ministry, we offer a four-year Bachelor of Arts in Ministerial Education. This degree equips the student with all the basic skills needed to pastor a church. In addition, it prepares them for advanced degree training.


For students who are not sure about their future ministry, we recommend our two-year Associate of Arts program in Bible and theology. This program is designed to give students the necessary biblical and spiritual tools so they can become soul-winners, wise parents, and a blessing to any church. This provides the heart of our Bible program, plus valuable training in the history of the Christian church, and specifically, our Wesleyan heritage.

We now have three full-time Bible faculty (a PhD, a DMin, and a 60-hour MA). In 2002, the Lord willing, we will add another full-time teacher to our ministerial department (another PhD). This will enable us to strengthen our language courses and eventually begin a Master's Degree program.


The Schmul Library and Chapel, a separate facility from the main library, has been a great blessing to our ministerial students. Here they are able to study and do research in a pleasant environment, surrounded by the best in Wesleyan/holiness literature. Add to that computer research tools, and our minis-

terial students are provided with access to materials that cannot be found on any other Bible college campus.

At GBS we are determined that our students embrace and demonstrate an unreserved commitment to the worship of God, a submission to the authority of the Scriptures, and a life of personal holiness. We want to send them out equipped to penetrate the darkness of our age with the truth of God's Word.





he Division of General Education is committed to helping prepare students to serve in areas of auxiliary ministry, such as Sunday school or children's church, and in areas not commonly considered to be ministry-related, such as an office or business environment. The mission of the division is to help develop a student's spiritual stability and scope of ministry. We want to produce students with carefully trained hearts and consistently disciplined minds.

The Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in Church and Family Ministry is perhaps one of the most flexible pro-

grams in the Bible college movement. Students may tailor their education to fit whatever ministry they believe that God has for them. Students have reported selecting this degree program after they had nearly concluded that Bible college did not fit into preparation for their life's work.

As academic trends move toward increasing experiential education, we are contemplating additional internship opportunities, particularly in the fields of children's ministry, office administration, and general business. This kind of modification will help students to

become better acclimated to their chosen field of service in a supportive, facilitating environment.

Ministry opportunities are plentiful in the Cincinnati area. Students in the Division of General Education may choose to participate in such activities as Kids Klub, Good News Club, urban mission chapels, jail team, short-term missions trips, friendship evangelism, and a variety of other Christian service avenues. While preparing for a life of service, students are challenged to be useful wherever they are and in whatever role is open to them.

educators. If you fit that category, start preparing NOW. Give careful attention to developing a spiritually vibrant devotional life. Get in the habit of sharing your faith with others. Develop good work habits and learn to save money and live on a budget. Volunteer in your local school to get some first-hand experience.

any people are aware that Martin Wells Knapp founded God's Bible School in the fall of 1900, but it is not as well known that R. E. McNeill founded the "Conservatory of Gospel Music" on this campus in the spring of 1901. Professor McNeill started what is now the Division of Music, because he believed that "there is a deep and extensively felt need of special training in gospel music."

The principal objective of the Division of Music is to educate musicians for Christian service, including ministries in the classroom and the local church. Emphasis is placed on helping each student formulate a Biblically-sound philosophy of music ministry.

We provide a fourfold education: (1) Performing organizations and courses in applied music prepare students for music ministry as vocalists, pianists, organists, instrumentalists, and Christian music educators. (2) Courses in church music and conducting techniques prepare students to be leaders of instrumental or choral ensembles and congregational singing who base their philosophy and practice on the Word of God. (3) Courses in the history and theory of music provide an understanding of the development of sacred and secular music from antiquity to the present. (4) Music methods and professional education courses prepare students to teach music in the Christian school.

Our faculty is dedicated to preserving and renewing the heritage of hymnody, gospel songs, and sacred music that exists within the conservative holiness tradition, while introducing new methods and available materials.

We offer two four-year BA programs in church music. The performance track is designed for students who plan to enter a Master's program in church music. The non-performance track is designed for students who plan to enter a church music ministry after graduation. There are two five-year programs in Christian school music education (one is a performance track and the other is a non-performance track) designed to train Christian music educators. Students teaching under the guidance of a cooperating teacher and a GBS supervisor is the climax of both programs. Another program is especially designed for students who wish to teach elementary music and general elementary classroom studies. Then there is also a two-year AA program designed for students who have only two years to study at GBS.

→ (p3) The core values that define God's Bible School and College are as follows:

The Bible—We believe in, and are committed to, the inerrant, infallible authority of Scripture as our basis for all faith and practice.

Godliness—We are committed to teaching young people that life is to be lived before a holy God and for His glory and honor. We are committed to developing students that know God intimately, love Him passionately, live for Him sacrificially, and reflect Him daily.

Knowledge—We are committed to encouraging and facilitating intellectual development. We seek to foster a love for learning that flows from a passion to serve well both our Lord and those for whom He died.

Character—We are committed to the development of moral virtues that make possible an effective life and ministry.

Servanthood—We are committed to the development of servant leadership in our students. We believe that all followers of Jesus are willing servants. We believe that the acquiring of knowledge is for the sole purpose of serving God and others.

People—We are committed to evangelism, missions, and social concern. We will teach our students to "love their neighbor as themselves."

Our core values have enabled us to formulate a mission statement for GBS. Our mission statement is as follows: God's Bible School and College seeks to glorify God and serve His church by providing higher education, centered in holy Scripture and shaped by Wesleyan conviction, thus preparing faithful servants to proclaim Jesus Christ and spread Scriptural holiness throughout the world.

In order to live out our core values and accomplish our mission, we have adopted the following vision



statement: God's Bible School and College will be a spiritually vibrant institution that is academically excellent, growth oriented, student centered, and financially sound.

Our vision statement targets five major objectives and allows us to create a series of goals and strategies to reach those objectives during the next five years.

Primary to our vision is the commitment to insure that GBS is a "spiritually vibrant" institution. We are primarily a spiritual enterprise. Nothing is more important than providing the environment and focus for our students to become and remain spiritually alive. Since true spirituality is knowing God through Christ and reflecting Him and His Word in a victorious obedient walk, we are committed to:

- 1. Promoting revivals, chapels, and other spiritual services that confront students with the presence of God and His claims upon their lives.
- 2. Conducting regular small-group sessions that provide nurture and accountability. These sessions are designed to assist in developing and maintaining a daily devotional time, personal victory, and a transparent and transformed life.
- 3. Developing and maintaining a campus/dorm environment that promotes personal discipline, cultivates holy virtue, seeks to develop cultural

refinement, offers opportunity for the development of God-given talents and discourages worldliness and waste of any sort.

- 4. Training that stresses excellence in Biblical knowledge.
- 5. Developing and maintaining a faculty and staff who are godly and worthy role models for our students to emulate.

We believe that these goals will produce a radical commitment to holy living which includes a careful lifestyle and an evident zeal for proclaiming the good news of the gospel in a contemporary culture.

Our second major objective is "academic excellence." Scholarship and spirituality are friends, not foes. We are committed to providing the very best in higher education, so that our students can master the areas of study that are important to their calling. To accomplish this, we are committed to:

- 1. Securing and maintaining the best faculty possible. This involves enhancing their skills and offering them continuing education on a regular basis.
- 2. Increasing the necessary educational resources available to our students in both the classroom and library.

(p5) festivities, have read about them on these pages. The *Revivalist*, which Knapp used so powerfully to create God's Bible School, has recorded the 100th anniversary of its birth.

Now in this final centenary issue, we turn specifically to GBS's vision for its future. Here you will find President Avery's thoughtful challenge for vigorous renewal and expansion, as well as subordinate goals set by other academic, spiritual, and administrative leaders. These are not empty dreams and unfounded speculations, for it is simplistic, at best, and deceitful, at worst, to gild the future with fool's gold. On these pages, rather, is a solid, thoughtful, and realistic agenda which will enable GBS to keep lighting lanterns for another century.

This agenda is anchored in yesterday, but focused on tomorrow; for heritage must become our springboard, not our sepulcher. Dozens of colleges are recalled only in memoirs filed in dusty folders or on plaques fixed to crumbling ruins. Some were caught in the twist of historic circumstance, but others disappeared because either they were so transfixed by their past that they could not move into their future, or else they were so enamored by

their future that they forgot their past. *Paralysis or amnesia?* In either case, the tragedy is the same.

It is clear, therefore, that God's Bible School—or any institution which survives to fulfill its destiny—must make this absolute commitment: *In essential conviction, we must be staunchly and unflinchingly traditional; but in relevant ministry, we must be daringly and unashamedly contemporary!* This paradox holds the key to our future, for "traditional" and "contemporary" are not antagonistic terms, but necessary partners, each complementing and balancing the other.

First, in essential conviction we must be staunchly and unflinchingly traditional! This does not mean clinging pathetically to quaint oddities and timeworn trifles, but vigorous reaffirmation of basic truths which never change. Many religious schools have abandoned their originating principles; but a century after its beginning, GBS has not! This constancy has been the gift of God, but also the grit of men determined to keep the charge which He has laid upon them. Now we are at a moment of historic opportunity, for our roots are both very deep and very wide, spreading throughout the entire holiness

movement. In that movement there are thousands of bewildered ones, distraught by massive compromise in their own schools and churches, who look to GBS as an unbending champion of foundational convictions. We cannot and we will not disappoint them. Our heritage is not for sale!

However, we must not only reaffirm it, but also understand and intelligently apply it. For this is the priceless treasure of classical "scriptural Christianity," transmitted to us in evangelical succession, catholic tradition, Wesleyan conviction, and holiness experience. Consider what this means:

Scriptural Christianity. Christ transcends culture, and so also does the Bible, the authoritative source of all we believe and teach. In the confusion of conflicting values, it speaks absolute and eternal truth, setting forth the Holy Law which condemns our sins and the Holy Gospel which saves us from them.

Evangelical Succession. We are in continuity with saints through all ages who have loved God in living personal relationship and who have resisted every attempt to turn Christianity into lifeless ceremony and rigid code. Thus we affirm the great "solas" of the Reformation—scripture alone, grace alone, and faith alone; and all this, of course, means Christ alone! And it is Christ alone we offer to a shattered world!

Catholic Tradition. Catholic means "universal," and it refers to Christ's whole church and its system of faith, worship, and discipline received from apostolic times and maintained in essence to this day. This legacy is normative to believers everywhere, unites us with all who confess Our Lord in Heaven and on earth, and saves us from narrow, lopsided, or cultic aberrations.

Wesleyan Conviction. We are Methodists, heirs of the Wesleyan Revival and committed to its basic insights. Nothing is more needed now among us than a thorough-going renewal of full-orbed, classical Wesleyanism in its understanding of sin, grace, holiness, the church, worship and sacraments, spiritual formation, and the gospel's transcendent hope.

Holiness Experience. In this period of shallow convictions and shabby living, we insist as ever that God can and God will change human nature, renewing us in holiness to do His will. This is sanctifying grace, and it issues in godly discipline, fervent piety, and passionate devotion to selfless ministry. "Without holiness no man shall see the Lord."

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But, second, in relevant ministry we must be daringly and unashamedly contemporary. This does not mean chasing the silly fads of depraved culture or of degraded religion, but courageous purpose to apply eternal truth creatively and effectively to this "present age." This speaks to our entire movement, and indeed to all the church, as well as to GBS; and its requirements are emphatic:

We must know our world, its leaders, philosophies, and trends. Since the entire scope of human thought and action is the scene of our redemptive mission, we must become familiar with history, politics, economics, philosophy, and

current events. We must know people, not seclude ourselves from them. How else can we speak the gospel relevantly to our times?

We must distinguish between what is central and what is peripheral. It is terminally tragic when preoccupation with the "old fashioned way" has more to do with archaic styles and stodgy methods than with the timeless message of the cross. That message is unalterable. But the methods we use must be adapted to speak creatively to the culture in which we live, provided, of course, that those methods never bring indignity to the message itself.

We must use all available tools to reach our world. Technological advance in travel and communication has brought the remotest places into instant contact; and the internet has brought an "information age" which has forever changed our world. Indisputably, these are avenues for great evil, but are they not also avenues for dynamic witness—talents which God has put into our hands for His service?

We must divest ourselves of narrow bias and provincial attitudes. In the clash of diverse colors, ethnic backgrounds, and cultural differences, we must devote our-

selves to what is essentially and irreducibly Christian, then subordinate the rest. Outmoded or irrelevant prejudices betray our cause, as do unfair claims of racial, cultural, or denominational superiority.

In a real sense, we must become "world Christians," renouncing the pettiness which has sometimes made us ineffective.

We must seize the moment. We neither can live in yesterday nor replicate it tomorrow. But in clear and current language we can speak the words of Jesus in the littered streets of our inner cities, the great forums of intellectual debate, the throbbing middle-class communities where we live, the lively crosscurrents of political competition, and the global openings we have everywhere for committed ministry. "This is the day the Lord has made. We will rejoice and be glad in it!"

Since those distant days when President McKinley ruled in Washington and Victoria Regina sat at Windsor, God's Bible School has been lighting lanterns against the night. For the past year, we have celebrated the century behind us; and now we celebrate the century before us. By God's grace, we will fulfill our destiny, committed joyously and unalterably to both traditional conviction and to contemporary ministry. Ours is still the call of God to every Christian personally and to all Christians collectively. In the final triumph, as we know, He who is the brightness of His Father's glory will turn all shadows into sunshine. But until then, we are His lamplighters, sent out everywhere, punching holes in the darkness.

- 4. Continuing to develop specialized library and resource centers, as well as practical, hands-on training programs for each major.
- 5. Staying abreast of emerging trends that affect evangelism and outreach methods. This means we are committed to developing an effective urban ministry program, offering training for students who want to evangelize and teach through the Internet, and offering adequate language training to address the rising population of non-English speaking peoples in America. We are also committed to providing training in radio broadcasting for those who wish to use this medium for the propagation of the gospel.
- 6. Seeking ways to meet the educational needs of a non-resident older population.

The third major objective of this institution is to be **"growth orient-ed."** As good stewards of the trust that is ours, we will never be placated by past or present accomplishments. Rather, we will earnestly pursue increasing excellence in the spiritual, academic, and administrative aspects of this institution. We will do this in the following ways:

1. Pursuing an increase in enrollment annually. We will contin-

- ue to refine and follow our five-year enrollment document.
- 2. Enlarging the financial base necessary to provide adequately for an expanding ministry.
- 3. Renovating present facilities and the planning and building of new ones. To do this, we will follow carefully our five-year plan and will develop a site plan for our campus.
- 4. Expanding campus properties, as available.

Our fourth major objective is to be "student centered." We believe that God has raised up this institution to develop and nurture Christian workers. We hold this as our sacred trust and realize it is the sole purpose of our existence. This means that we are committed to:

- 1. Viewing every student as a person of value and great potential.
- 2. Patiently working with students, realizing that most students who come to us are in need of further maturation and emotional growth.
- 3. Hiring only administrators and faculty who are willing to invest personal time to mentor and effect positive change in the life of every student.
- 4. Keeping all new program development and curriculum change responsive to the realities of the world in which our students will minister.
- 5. Creating opportunities for personal leadership development

- through campus organizations and ministry opportunities. We will both allow and encourage the development of student-led ministries.
- 6. Remaining sensitive to student concerns and needs as we address any issue on this campus.
- 7. Providing all scholarship assistance possible for students who need help and merit help.

Our fifth major objective is that God's Bible School and College will pursue a course that keeps it "financially sound." This means that the Administration and Trustees are committed to:

- 1. Pursuing financial policies that exceed the normal standard of financial responsibility and that will insure the continued development of the institution for the work and purpose of God.
- 2. Developing an outcome assessments document that links all strategic planning to the budgeting process.
- 3. Establishing and developing a Department of Institutional Advancement.
- 4. Increasing donor base by one percent annually.
- 5. Increasing present scholarship endowments to one million dollars within the next ten years.
- 6. Addressing remaining indebtedness, property acquisition, working capital needs, and new construction concerns through a capital campaign that is to be in place by the Fall of 2001.

To our readers who may not be accustomed to the language of strategic planning, let me assure you that tucked away in these broad objectives are many exciting things that will be unveiled as our future unfolds. These are exciting times to be alive, and this is an exciting time to be a part of God's Bible School and College. The Board of Trustees and the Administration are positioning this school, so that by God's grace it will be an effective force for His kingdom for another century or until Jesus comes.
