

JOB'S REAL PAIN

Job in the first five verses of chapter one is of rare beauty. Job's faith is expressed as perfect and complete. His family was the envy of every parent. His fortune was the largest in the East, and his fame was world renowned. Job's life is portrayed on a canvas of perfect tranquility.

In the course of time, Satan was allowed to paint his own gruesome scene into Job's life. In successive strokes of calamity, Job's peaceful world was turned into utter chaos. The first blow to fall was the loss of his financial empire. It was the second blow, however, that took away his greatest treasure—ten wonderful children. Job was staggered by these vicious blows, but he was still able to hold his head up and declare his faith in God. All Job had to say was "the Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away; blessed be the name of the Lord."

Satan was given permission to test Job further, but this time he could touch him physically. Job was smitten with a type of leprosy known as elephantiasis. Massive ulcerous sores covered his body. His limbs were so swollen he became disfigured and unrecognizable. He was forced to sit as an outcast on the rubbish heap. His wife counseled him to curse God and die, while his friends could only sit and watch in stunned silence.

In the beginning of his affliction, Job defended God by acknowledging that we must accept the bad as well as the good from His hand. In contemporary expression, Job understood that trouble eventually knocks at everyone's door. As days turned to weeks and months, Job began to feel that trouble had not only knocked, but literally had banged the door down and rushed in with violent disregard. The loss of all in one swift stroke left him reeling under the intolerable burden of sorrow and suffering. The constant itching and pain of his sores, and the nausea and other side effects of his illness finally begin to take its emotional and spiritual toll on Job. He sank beneath the billows of despair and depression. He cursed the day of his birth. He felt that God was unfair and had "shot him through with arrows." Job became so weary and bewildered by his suffering that he finally began to feel that God had only blessed him with so much in order that He could "take it away and harm him."

As the story progresses, you see that Job's real pain was far more than physical or emotional. It was the pain of failing to understand why God was letting this happen to a man who was indeed "blameless." Job had been living right, and he knew it. So why was God letting all this suffering fall on him?

As I thought of Job, I thought about the many people who will read the words that I have written and will identify with the story. Moms and dads, church leaders and pastors, young couples and senior saints, lonely singles and lively teenagers from all walks of life have an affinity with Job's "real pain." I thought of a precious young couple with whom I went to school whose fifteen-year-old son recently died mysteriously in his sleep. Missions Around The World

Each month we publish brief "field reports" from missionaries around the world. Missionaries are invited to send us their newsletters and other information about their activities. GBS graduates are especially urged to respond, but we also wish to include others who uphold our vision and our commitment.

AFRICA

Three missions in South Africa have joined efforts in conducting a tent meeting with services three times a day. These include the Bible Holiness Church Mission, ICHA Missions, and Pilgrim Missions (Allegheny Region). Reports include several conversions.

BELIZE

"People are getting saved and being helped. We are having to enlarge our school at Santa Familia to take care of the new converts' children. They want them to be educated in a Christian school. We went down on June 7 to lay the foundation of a new building that is 70 feet by 30 feet. It will contain a large learning center, a computer classroom, principal's office and a storage area. The Rev. and Mrs. Bence Miller were with us the 6th of June and gave a wonderful report."—The Rev. Robert Thompson, Director, Evangelical Holiness Church.

COLUMBIA

"In January of this year we entered the city of Bogota with the message of holiness. The Rev. Edermin Cortes informs us that from an initial group of thirty there, there are now more than ninety in attendance at services. The terrorism that plagues the country has claimed the lives of fifteen pastors in the last six months. However the church continues forward."—Raymond Shreve, Evangelical Wesleyan Mission

ECUADOR

Three churches are reported as having been started by "spontaneous multiplication" from a congregation started by Pablo Cortez among a people previously without a holiness witness. As these churches continue to develop and grow, there is evidence of several persons in them who are qualified to assume leadership roles.

EGYPT

Recently one thousand persons crowded a church in the Cairo area, and there were 192 conversions reported. (p23)

erched on a gentle hillside out on the Nebraska prairies, Bethphage Mission looks down over the village of Axtell. The "Mission"—as it is often called—was established in 1913

God's call meant first a Lutheran pulpit, and then this Christian home of mercy for the "feeble-minded" discards of an ignorant and self-indulgent culture. The ardent young pastor died at 34; and in a simple grave at the campus edge, he lies near Jesus' brothers whom he served, waiting with them for the trumpet's sound.


ture of Jesus Our Redeemer, His eyes looking deeply into our own, and His arms outstretched to us in welcome.

As sunshine pours through that resplendent glass, the chancel is

splashed with moving color; the Saviour's face becomes radiant with warmth and light; and in that illuminating moment, He seems ready to step out of the the stained-glass and grace us with His touch. This does not happen to everyone, of course, but only to those who in faith and love are lifting up their hearts to Him. For there is no intrinsic grace in the glass, pigment, and lead with which we make our churches' windows. But, then, neither is there intrinsic grace in the oak-

en panels or the iron screws with which we make our churches' altars. Yet the Holy Spirit who descends at open altars is also pleased to use colored windows as signs of offered grace; for in this way, as in countless others, He is determined to make Jesus real to us.

For Jesus must be real to us, since He is the bridge between us and God. This means, first, that He must be real to us in the written accounts of Holy Scripture, for this is the objective record of His coming to us in flesh and blood. But, second, He must also be real to us in the transforming joy of personal relationship, for this is the subjective assurance of His coming to us now. One is formal and (p26)



GBS will soon be celebrating its 100th birthday. Already preparations are under way to mark the Grand Centenary Year, which officially will begin with Heritage Week and Homecoming 1999 and continue through the same events in the fall of the year 2000. Preparatory activities will focus upon the Centenary; and from time-to-time the Revivalist will publish "Centenary Scenes" from our rich history—little "vignettes" from the fascinating procession of people and events on our historic "Hilltop."

THE DOORS SWING OPEN ON THE HILLTOP

"O God, we give this property to Thee, asking that Thy power and Thy glory may come into it just now and abide forever." This was the prayer offered by evangelist Seth C. Rees at the dedication of God's Bible School's campus, Wednesday, September 26, 1900. It was held in connection with the "Salvation Park Autumnal Holiness Convention," which had opened the night before under the direction of the school's founder, the Rev. Martin Wells Knapp.

"Fourteen ministers and evangelists were present, as well as

many close associates, students, and friends of the Bible school," notes Lloyd R. Day in his GBS history, written in the 1940's. "The capacity of the buildings was taxed to the limit, and there was already a great need for additional buildings." Services were held in the main building's ornate double-parlor, which had


hastily been turned into a chapel.


According to *The Revivalist*, the dedication service began at 8:00 p.m. "A call was made for those who wished to dedicate themselves to the Lord to come forward. Two responded" and knelt with "Brother and Sister Knapp... around a small table upon which lay the Holy Bible." Rees, Knapp's friend and colleague, then led the congregation in earnest prayer. Fortunately an unnamed stenographer wrote down his words: "We give this property to Thee for the interests of Thy kingdom... where Thy people may receive such power as to send them out with more than multiplied energy to minister Thy truth all over the world."

Only weeks before, Knapp, a fiery Methodist preacher, had arranged the purchase of the two acres and two buildings for the sum of \$20,000. A three-story brick mansion contained rooms for offices, classrooms, as well as the chapel, while the wood-frame house behind it could be used for sleeping quarters. From the beginning it was clear that this all was the "magnificent obsession" of Knapp, described by A. M. Hills as "a little bundle of nerves and brain and heart, all alive and on fire for God and holiness."

Eight years before, he had come to Cincinnati from Albion, Michigan, bringing with him an expanding publishing ministry, which included several books from his facile pen, as well as *The Revivalist*, a vigorous monthly publication which he had established in 1888 and whose circulation had grown to around 20,000. In the Queen City area he quickly became a catalyst for widespread holiness renewal, organizing public meetings, preaching at revivals, and starting inner city rescue missions. *The Revivalist* continued to give him a national voice of great influence. In its edition of June 21, 1900, he announced his plans for a "training school... where the Bible will be the main book studied" and where "the Holy Ghost, its Author, will be acknowledged Superintendent and Interpreter..."

According to a later account, that opening convention was "one of unction and power" with people "claiming victory at every service." Presumably, Rees--described as "a John the Beloved, with unction, grace, and power"--shared the pulpit with Knapp; and William and Mabel Hirst, the first missionaries ever sent out by GBS, were present to say goodbye before leaving for Africa. "Recitations" began officially the next day for 72 students who had enrolled for a term of 40 weeks without vacations. In addition to the Bible, they were to study grammar, orthography, (p17)





evastated, I stood in shock, momentarily unable to move. Coming from the crumpled ruin of the automobile came a faint voice. "Please, somebody, help me." The woman's agonizing plea brought me back to the reality of the situation that my mind still did not want to believe. I ran to my cell phone and dialed 911. I ran back to the accident site and then back to my cell phone again, this time to call my pastor. Did I ever need someone at a time like this! I was starting to fall apart. Then I saw the condition of the driver of the wrecked vehicle; the greatest fear I had ever known overwhelmed me. I grabbed the shoulders of an older man who had walked up to the scene and I hung on for dear life.

When I heard the paramedic call for the coroner, my worst fears were confirmed. The driver had been killed on impact. Thank God the police officer was sensitive to my trauma as he helped me to the front seat of the police car. Speechless, I handed him my wallet. Instead of proceeding with his work, he paused and began to pray for me. You cannot know the impact of that prayer. I sensed the gentleness of God—He was looking out for me even at a time like this.

That morning of March 7, 1995, was very grey. I had been on my new job as a salesman for about a month. I left the office to make a call on a potential customer at about 10:30. Considering the weather, I drove with what I thought was extra precaution. I approached a hazardous intersection in our community with great care. I still remember looking both directions twice, paying particular attention to a tractor-trailer coming from the south. I thought all was clear as I eased out into the intersection. To my greatest horror and disbelief a car, seemingly coming from nowhere, glanced off the front of my

van and headed straight into the path of the tractor-trailer. My first thought was "this can't be real!!!" I continued through the intersection and parked my van, which had incurred very little damage. The other car, however, had impacted the rig with tremendous force, bouncing off the front of the truck like a toy.

For many days I was suspended in a state of agony. What had I done? What *could* I have done? What could I do *now*? What about the family of the victims? Even before I had opened my eyes that next morning, I was plagued by the thought that I had sent a man into eternity! I later received some comfort when I learned that the deceased man was another preacher. At least I had the hope that he was enjoying the light of eternity rather than the eternal night and torment of the lost.

Still, I ached inside. I wanted to express my sorrow to the family. What could words do? I did not know, but somehow I wanted to communicate. My pastor made the contacts and set up a meeting with the family. They were keeping vigil at the hospital where their mother, the other occupant of the car, lay in intensive care. (Thirty-five days later she, too, died.) I will never forget the words of the oldest son, Eric. I still cling to them till this day.

He looked at me and said, "My daddy would not want the devil to get any glory out of his death. You're forgiven."

Forgiven!! This had been his father, yet he was forgiving me! I had never heard sweeter, more welcome words. The devil cannot win over forgiveness.

Even though I still suffer from the awful memories, what a load has been lifted by forgiveness! Many today carry a burden of guilt, and many are carrying the weight of an unforgiving heart. Ephesians 4:32 gives an answer: "And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

"All manner of sin and blasphemy shall be forgiven unto men..." (Matthew 12:31)

I know of no subject more haunting than that of the "unpardonable sin." So frightening is the thought that often a mere discussion or sermon on the topic leaves one shaken in spirit, perhaps wondering if somehow—maybe unwittingly in a moment of levity or idleness—he or she may have crossed the point of no return and drifted beyond the reach of God's mercy.

Having recently reviewed this "hard saying" of Jesus, I was again reminded of the pressing need to *clearly define* for the sake of such conscientious souls the exact nature of the unforgivable sin. The importance of this cannot be over-stressed. The context of Jesus' statement is one in which informed religious leaders dismissed the obvious work of the Holy Spirit as being demonic in origin. Their offense was calculated and specific. Knowing better, they declared the Holy Spirit which was at work in Jesus to be a devilish spirit! John Wesley, among others, insists that this —"neither more nor less"—constitutes the unpardonable transgression.

Sadly, our functioning definition of the unpardonable sin has been sometimes broadened to include persistent grieving or quenching of the Spirit. This goes beyond what Jesus said. It has been occasionally suggested, even directly asserted, that one who resists or ignores the Spirit is in danger of being abandoned by Him forever. Haunting illustrations of others who resisted the Spirit, never to be spoken to again, hang funeral crepe over an increasingly dismal picture. Consequently, hyper-sensitive people—people who may well have been guilty of grieving the Spirit by past actions or inactions—fall easily into confusion, sometimes despair.

Now it must be said with great emphasis that it is a serious matter to quench, grieve or trifle with the Holy Spirit. Furthermore, deliberate and prolonged grieving of the Spirit can result in hardness of heart which can, in turn, render one insensitive to the Spirit's workings. This condition of spiritual dullness or deadness can then *seem* like one in which God has departed.

But Scripture assures us that God is always calling. The problem is we can render ourselves incapable of hearing. Someone in this situation is in real spiritual peril, to be sure, but *there is yet hope* if such a one will throw himself upon the mercy of God and retrace his prodigal steps! But the point is that *such a one has not met Jesus' specific criteria* of the unpardonable sin.

This brings us then to a bright and happy note in an otherwise dreadful text, and a note that is consistently overlooked. Jesus prefaced His ominous warning with a hope-filled promise: "All manner of sin and blasphemy shall be forgiven unto men." What cause for rejoicing! Excepting a vary narrowly-defined act (knowingly attributing the works of the Spirit to the devil), our Savior authoritatively declares every sin to be forgivable. What more could He say to the despairing soul? "Every sin may be forgiven." Hear it! Believe it! And, thankfully, among the list of "forgivable transgressions" are the sins of grieving and quenching the Spirit, as lamentable as they are. You have His Word on it!

CATCHING THE WINDS OF THE SPIRIT

am brought to consciousness by the sounding of my alarm. I turn over and push my body out of bed, overcoming the urge to lie down again. I stagger into the bathroom where I turn off the alarm. As I push sleep out of my eyes with a warm washcloth and proceed to dress in the soft light, I am aware that what takes place in the next hour or two will determine the fate of my day.

I go to my place of solitude and stillness. Here, in the morning calm, I meet with God. I talk with Him, read His Word, carefully marking the passages that speak to me and my situation. Then I talk with Him again. I unburden my heart, and He listens. I speak of personal struggles and desires, of family concerns and ministry burdens. I ask for His blessing. I praise Him for His help.

While not fully comprehending, yet I understand that something is happening. In my mind I see an eagle in the morning light. It is seeking a thermal, a rising warm current of air which is the result of the morning sun heating the ground mass below. The eagle does not flap its wings but only extends them. As it rides the wind to an elevated place in the heavens, it is now in a position of new advantage. From this lofty place it can see more ground, and fly higher and longer. When the time comes to dive on its prey, it can plummet with great speed.

Now I perceive that something like this is happening to me. The winds of God's Spirit are lifting me

effortlessly upward. I merely extend my soul-wings by prayer and meditation, and they cause me to catch the divine updrafts. Now I am rising to a new position of power, vision, and grace.

Experience has taught me how difficult and even futile it is to find this advantage point without my quiet time with God. I struggle with simple tasks; I react to irritations; my spirit is disordered; my heart lacks vision and direction. I flap my wings, but at the end of the day, I know that I have remained earthbound; I have traveled a short distance. The weight of living has overcome my feeble strength.

But today is different. I can feel myself soaring aloft. The air here is clean and crisp. No earthbound objects are blurring my vision. I breathe deeply and feel the composure of His lovely presence. I am riding the free wind of His Spirit, and I already know that today will be something like a holiday, because the energy for living and working will be His and not mine.

"Lord, let every day be like today."

HIGH SCHOOL COMMENCEMENT 73 YEARS LATE!

Lenos Bereman Perry, Cloverdale, Indiana, is a high school graduate at last—73 years late! Mrs. Perry, now age 90, attended GBS classes from 1922-1926, but left school three weeks prior



to graduation. But she never forgot her happy days on the Hilltop; and finally on May 10 of this year, she returned to the campus for the first time. Surrounded by 17 family members and this year's high school seniors, she received her diploma from Principal Paul Clemens. "I cannot tell you how much my visit to GBS means to me," she says.

Warren G. Harding was President of the United States when she boarded a train in Indianapolis for Cincinnati. Only 13 years old, she was sent to GBS by her mother, who had learned of the school from two of its former employees who boarded in the Bereman home. "For most of her nearly four years at GBS Lenos was the youngest student," notes her daughter, Mrs. Phyllis J. Orman of Indianapolis. "From the beginning Brother Meredith Standley and his wife befriended her, and she was a frequent guest in their living quarters."

She has fond memories of President Standley speaking in chapel, singing a duet with her at a funeral, participating with students in sledding fun during



winter and then offering them hot chocolate in his home afterwards. "Father-figure, mentor, teacher, or friend—whatever Meredith Standley was to Lenos Pauline Bereman—they formed a loving, lasting Christian bond." Whenever "Lenos relates stories that include Brother Standley, a light comes to her eyes and a smile on her lips."

She also recalls algebra, Latin, and geometry classes; "junior theology" in which she memorized a great deal of scripture; and activities in choir, where she sang alto; and orchestra, where she played violin. Classes were held on weekdays, except that Saturday morning was substituted for Monday morning. In the dormitory, a warning bell for "lights out" rang at 9:45 p. m., and fifteen minutes later, the electric power off. GBS's turned famous Thanksgiving dinners are also etched firmly in her memory.

But shortly before her graduation ceremony, she returned to Indianapolis in order to participate in a friend's wedding as maid of honor. Instead, "Lenos herself became a bride, and there was a double wedding," her daughter comments. Lenos eventually became the mother of six children and now has 15 grandchildren and 19 great grand-children. During the Depression she became a



telegraph operator; and then after an interval as homemaker, she worked in banking for twenty years. She has served as a church pianist, organist and choir member, and is also an accomplished seamstress.

"I am enormously proud of my mother," adds Mrs. Orman. "She has been a Christian all of her life and has lived a life of accomplishments. The education she received at God's BIble School served her well." Mrs. Perry, a widow for 33 years, lives alone with pleasant memories of her long-postponed GBS graduation. "I hope I will be able to visit the school again before I die; but if not, my thoughts and prayers are with you."



age of seven and at eleven was called to be a missionary to China. After graduating from high school and Kansas City Business College, she was em-



ployed by the J. C. Penney Company. She was greatly revived in heart during a tent meeting held by Wesleyan Methodist ministers and through their influence enrolled at God's Bible School and College.

While at GBS she experienced the blessing of entire sanctification and settled her call to missionary service in China. During summers she led evangelistic teams representing the school and held revival meetings. In 1930 she graduated from GBS and did a year's graduate work. It was at GBS that she met met Harry L. Shreve, to whom she was married August 8, 1934. In November they sailed for China to begin missionary service under the Oriental Missionary Society; and it was there that their only child, Raymond L., was born August 14, 1941. They remained in China until 1949 and then spent a year in missionary service in the Philippines. In January 1952 Harry and Ina Shreve founded Evangelical Wesleyan Mission, Inc., under which they worked as missionaries in Cuba until forced out by the communist regime of Fidel Castro.

In 1963 the Shreves began operations in Key West, Florida, ministering to Cuban refugees fleeing from the oppression in their homeland. Over the next 25 years a church, a school, and a ministry to US military personnel developed. This also became a home base for many missionary operatings both in the US

and abroad. In 1964 the Shreves established a conservative holiness work in Taiwan.

Harry Shreve died in 1982, and in 1987 Ina married Ezra McVey, a former GBS schoolmate. In 1995 she moved with her husband to Sea Breeze Manor, where she lived until her death. Funeral services were at Hobe Sound Bible Church, the Rev. Paul Pierpoint and the Rev. James O. Poe, officiating, with interment in Fernhill Memorial Gardens, Stuart, Florida.

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(p6) penmanship, reading, and music. Faculty included Knapp, Beatrice Finney, Veda Anderson, and Prof. Robert McNeill, the latter of whom was to develop the "Bible-school Conservatory of Gospel Music."

Ninety-nine years have passed since Seth C. Rees prayed that God's "power and glory" would come upon the new Bible school and "abide forever." GBS has now entered its one hundredth year; and Knapp's brick, three-story mansion remains the administrative center of its campus. That ornate double-parlor where it all began—certainly one of the most significant historical sites in the holiness movement—still welcomes students to a school determined to send them "with more than multiplied energy to minister" God's "truth all over the world."



ESTATE PLANNING TO AVOID NURSING HOME SPEND-DOWN

Bill and Mary Smith, a fictitious couple, lived comfortably on their farm in central Indiana, which had been purchased just after the Depression for \$4,000.00 at approximately \$20.00 per acre. Because of its location close to an Indianapolis "bedroom community," the Smith farm became prime real estate for developers.

Bill and Mary had declined several lucrative offers because of their love for their farm. Then one day, Bill's doctor gave them some bad news. Bill had colon cancer and it seemed to be spreading rapidly. Bill's last days were spent in an endless cycle of chemotherapy and rest. Finally it ended with Mary and the family at his side.

Since Bill and Mary had lived in Indiana, their property was owned in joint tenancy with the right of survivorship, which is also true of most other states with the exception of California and Wisconsin. Consequently Bill's share of the estate passed on to Mary without a problem. BIll and Mary even had a will that stated this as their desire. Probate court did not even get involved because the laws of Indiana provide for the right of survivorship.

Mary's children began to have concerns for their mother's safety and urged her to think about her future. As their mother's health began to decline, they urged her to sell the farm and move in with her daughter. They soon discovered the family farm had become a veritable gold mine because of skyrocketing real estate values.

A stroke, however, made it necessary to consider other options for Mary before the farm could be sold. While she was incompetent and unable to handle her affairs, Mary's children had to take the legal steps necessary to get a conservatorship for their mother. This gave them the right to handle her affairs and make decisions in her behalf.

After a lengthy hospital stay, Mary was moved to a local rehabilitation center. While there, Mary regained some of her communication skills and understood that her children has a conservatorship for her. She agreed that they should sell the farm and use the money to provide for her care, especially since nursing home care was looming on the horizon. They found out that there would be problems with Medicaid if Mary's assets were above the specified level.

A developer was found and Mary's estate was soon increased by \$800,000.00 (200 acres x \$4000.00/acre). Now a new problem arose—capital gains taxes to the federal government. Because the value of the Smith farm had increased from \$4,000.00 in the 1930's to \$800,000 in the 1990's, Mary's estate was assessed taxes amounting to between \$40,000 - \$50,000.00.

Mary's estate is still worth over \$750,000.00 when her personal effects are added. We will work with the amount from her real estate sale only. Nursing home costs will now be assessed against this amount until Mary's assets are low enough for Medicaid benefits to begin paying for her care. The 1999 Medicaid Desk Reference says that the average nursing home rate for Central Indiana is \$3,422.07 per month. Mary's estate will have to

pay \$41,064.84 each year until her assets are low enough that Medicaid will begin to pay for her care. Her estate will experience a major spend-down effect if Mary lingers for several years, which is quite possible.

The area of estate planning should be referred to qualified estate planners and attorneys specializing in Elder Law. It would be quite possible to minimize and in some cases eliminate these losses to Bill and Mary's estate. Proper estate planning while they were still in control of their affairs would have made a drastic difference to Bill and Mary Smith and their heirs.

I believe it is wise stewardship of our God-given resources to make certain our assets go to support our families and God's Kingdom work. I would encourage all the Revivalist Family to contact the Estate Planning office at God's Bible School and College for help in their estate work and to include GBS in their beneficial giving.

I believe this should be done by everyone before any final eventualities become realities. We wisely prepare for eternity, but God commends those who provide an inheritance for their children's children.



Feach them the importance of hard work

⇒(p5) external, the other is experiential and internal. Both are essential, and both are by the Spirit, who testifies of Jesus in the Word and then brings Him to our hearts. He records the miracle of the Incarnation in the one and affirms it in the other.

For Jesus who came graciously to dwell among us dwells graciously among us yet. Once He walked our streets, heard our cries, and wept our tears. For us He came; for us He died; for us He rose again. For us, too, He ascended to the Father. But He never really left us; and still He walks our streets, hears our cries, and weeps our tears. "I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you," He promised (Jn. 14:18); and by this He meant that the Holy Spirit would make Him as near to us and as dear to us as to those He touched in old Judea. "He will glorify me, for He will take of what is Mine and declare it to you" (Jn. 15:26), He added. Always the Spirit is doing this; and at every turn of the road, He confronts us with the crucified and risen Lord.

So it is the Spirit who brings Jesus Christ to us, and it is also the Spirit who brings us to Jesus Christ. Since we are rebels, proud and stubborn, He battles with us

(p3) pastor who was carelessly voted out of his church and left to pick up the pieces of his shattered future and heal the wounds of his embittered children. I thought of a senior saint forced into a lonely nursing home. I thought of a faithful administrator suffering the terrible pains of burnout and deep depression from having given all to advance God's kingdom. I thought of a young wife left alone with two small children after the tragic death of her husband. I thought of a young teenage girl trying hard to live for God in a godless environment, who brutally lost her virginity to a wicked stepfather's incestuous behavior.

Like Job, each of these people have journeyed down the treacherous path of pain and to the dark places of sorrow and suffering and can't understand why. Perhaps each of us can identify with Job. None of us are strangers to discouragement and despair. We, too, battle with the painful question: Why? The real question is not why, but how do we respond? Do we just give up and quit? Do we become bitter and turn our backs on both God and man? The answer, of course, is a resounding NO! The great lesson learned from the book of Job is that we have a heavenly Father who can and does bring triumph out of trial and blessing out of brokenness. Job teaches us that God has a way of using suffering in our lives to make us better. Someone has said that it is doubtful that God can use any man greatly until He has hurt him deeply. Suffering has a way of seasoning and sanctifying the soul like nothing else we will ever experience in life. The tragic marriage and personal suffering of Hannah Whitehall Smith became the seedbed out of which grew unbelievably rich and blessed devotional writings. J. B. Phillips, who is well

known for his beautiful translation of the New Testament, lived in a constant struggle against depression. His biographers wrote of him, "He knew anxiety and depression from which there was only temporary release. For a period of fifty years he had to cope with psychological disturbance and dark depression. And while he never lost his faith in God, he never ceased to struggle against mental pain." William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army, came to a point more than once in his ministry that he was so drained and dried out that he wanted to guit and get some respectable job that would keep him and his wife Catherine going. William Booth, however, is remembered by the Salvationists as a tower of strength, a man of abounding energy and unrelenting in his warfare against sin. Behind the scenes, though, we see a glimpse of his humanity and his being subject, as we all are, to depression in the face of exhaustion and hardship.

The secret to all of these people's successful lives and the secret to your success, is simply in "going on" when life is difficult. They kept their faith in Him who knows what's best.

Are you under great stress and facing deep suffering? Are you under great pressure beyond your ability to endure? Are you discouraged? Are you asking questions that seem to have no good answer? You are in good company. The great saints who have gone before you did too.

Life will afflict all of us with trouble and pain. We will all be tempted to turn and run or to give up and quit. Life will tumble in someday for all of us; but when it does, just keep holding on and keep going on. Victory and unspeakable blessing will be yours in the end.

about our treason; and this is called *conviction*. Since we must regret our sins and then renounce them, He leads us to repentance; and this is called *contrition*. Since we must be restored to Heaven's favor, He brings us to pardon and new birth, and this is called *conversion*. Jesus now begins His holy, gentle life within us; and this life, initiated by the Spirit is also nourished by the Spirit. Always it is God the Spirit who is the bond of union between us and God the Son, even as He also is the bond of union between the Persons of the Triune but Undivided Godhead. It is in this role that He continually seeks to deepen our fellowship with Jesus and renew our life in Him.

In the Holy Word declared with power; in the means of grace received with joy; in the love of friends and in the lives of saints; in the whisper of prayer and in the round of duty; and in the sacred acts and solemn silences of the congregation, the Spirit glorifies the Son, who draws near to us as we draw near to Him. Always the Spirit is opening such doors into transcendence for us; but there are others, too, sometimes in most unexpected places. But wherever He opens them, light glimmers through to us from paradise; and in that light Our Lord Jesus comes to beckon us.

For many sensitive, yearning souls, the rich imagery of art, symbol, architecture, and music is such a door. As we know, all truth belongs to God; and so likewise, all beauty belongs to Him, who is Himself the essence of what is beautiful and true. All beauty—whether in heaven or on earth—is but a revelation of His own; and the beauty here is only a reflection of the beauty there. Perhaps to lure us to Himself, He has placed within us a love of beauty; and He has also equipped us with the creative urge to replicate it. We do not know what opportunities are in heaven to perfect that urge, but certainly our best efforts here are feeble and incomplete. Yet they are intimations of the glory which awaits us; and even now the Spirit uses them as points of access between the world below and the world above.

Remember the swelling music of J. S. Bach, who so often signed his scores "Sola Gloria Dei"—for the glory of God alone. Recall Holman Hunt's "The Light of the World," that noble painting in St. Paul's in which Jesus knocks upon a door long closed against Him. Picture a graceful spire pointing up to heaven and raising the Redeemer's cross upon the smudged and sooty skyline of the most secular and savage of our cities. Does not the Spirit use these as mighty links to Jesus?

Or think of Zion Chapel, and its glowing window. Never shall I forget my own, dear mother weeping as she gazed upon that splendid glass. But her weeping was not sad, but joyous; and her heart was filled with longing for Him; and as her longing met His own, He did step out of that stained-glass window to enfold His aging dear one in His strong and loving arms. That was long ago, and Mother is not aging now; for she has passed into the

light where there are no calendars to count the years. Does she recall His coming to her in Zion Chapel? Perhaps someday I shall think to ask her; but what is more important is that He who was real to her then is more real to her now.

Yet for millions He stays imprisoned in the arched and colored windows. He is splendid there, and He is invoked at weddings or at funerals; but He is no more relevant to daily life than Washington and Lincoln, all framed and matted on the schoolhouse wall. Like them, He is a distant hero, much admired but mostly disregarded. This stained-glass Jesus elicits sentimental feelings; and sometimes He is used like a rabbit's foot to ward off suffering and distress. But to those who think of Him like this, He is merely a flitting shadow—not at all the real, flesh-and-blood Saviour who strides manfully through the gospels and still thrusts Himself into the rhythms of our lives.

Consider also those whose sin is not to disregard Him but to distort Him. They talk constantly of Jesus, memorize His words, and argue about their meaning. But He is never real to them, for they have no conception of who He really is. Glibly they call Him Saviour but will not make Him Lord! This distinction He never lets us make, for He will not be the one unless He also is the other. They sing about Him, pray to Him, and say they love Him greatly. But they have no serious intention of taking up His cross to follow Him in loyalty and obedience. True, their Jesus makes them comfortable and soft; but He is not the real Jesus who lifts our feet from hell and brings them safe to heaven.

Think, too, of those grim and determined souls who have made Him like themselves—narrow, rigid, and severe. Theirs is a particularly ugly caricature of Him, not at all like the winsome friend of sinners who came to us by Mary's womb. These are sincere and serious about religion. But, alas, it is mostly an empty routine of dutiful performance, rigid codes, and heavy burdens; and there is none of the gladness which the gospel promises or of the faith which it provides. This is Christianity without Christ, and it is mean and monstrous. For Jesus is Emmanuel, "God with us"; and if His gospel means anything at all, it means that He is with us now and that He will be with us forever.

Out on the Nebraska prairies Pastor Dahl is sleeping near the graves of those he served; and nearby, Zion Chapel towers above the buildings which surround it. Above the altar is that stained-glass window in which Jesus Our Redeemer opens His arms to us. In that lovely sanctuary He still is ready to step out of the beautiful glass to those whose longing meets His own. But then everywhere He is doing that; and always it is by the Spirit, who in countless ways is determined to make Him real.
